The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) announced additional distributions from the Provider Relief Fund, distributing \$15 billion to eligible providers that participate in state Medicaid and CHIP programs and have not received a payment and \$10 billion to safety net hospitals. HHS launched an enhanced Provider Relief Fund Payment Portal that will allow eligible Medicaid and CHIP providers to report their annual patient revenue to help determine their payment.
