Updates:

The Iowa Department of Human Services (IDHS) has launched a "COVID Recovery Iowa" program to help farmers, small business owners, healthcare workers, and others on the front lines of the pandemic, deal with emotional and financial stress.

IDHS is partnering with Abbe Center for Community Mental Health Inc., Heartland Family Service, ISU Extension, Pathways Behavioral Sciences and the University of Iowa to provide recovery resources, including:

- Confidential counseling through the Iowa Concern Hotline
- Virtual group activities, including yoga and cooking
- Discussions about how COVID-19 has changed the workplace
- Strategies to deal with stress or help others dealing with stress on the farm
- How to avoid burnout and self-care tips
- Question. Persuade. Refer. (QPR) suicide prevention training
- Mental health first aid
- Family financial consultations
- Farm financial planning

Jun 24, 2020 -- Providing in a Pandemic: The Challenges of Rural Maternity Care Just Got More Difficult: Addresses rural maternal healthcare challenges and the additional burden the COVID-19 pandemic has placed on new mothers and access to care. Discusses how the pandemic has highlighted the importance of midwives and doulas, describes changes necessary to make midwifery more accessible for people of all socioeconomic and racial backgrounds. Jun 23, 2020 -- HHS Announces Partnership with Morehouse School of Medicine to Fight COVID-19 in Racial and Ethnic Minority and Vulnerable Communities: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Minority Health (OMH) selected the Morehouse School of Medicine as the awardee for a new \$40 million initiative to fight COVID-19 in racial and ethnic minority, rural and socially vulnerable communities. The National Infrastructure for Mitigating the Impact of COVID-19 within Racial and Ethnic Minority Communities (NIMIC) Initiative is a three-year project working with community-based organizations to deliver resources to fight the pandemic. Jun 22, 2020 -- Trump Administration Issues Call to Action Based on New Data Detailing COVID-19 Impacts on Medicare Beneficiaries: The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) called for a commitment to value-based care due to Medicare claims data that shows the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Medicare population. Data highlights disparities in health outcomes for minority communities and low-income populations and

Jun 17, 2020 -- Alexander: Make the Two Most Important COVID-19 Telehealth Policy Changes Permanent: Senate health committee Chairman Lamar Alexander recommended the federal government permanently extend policy changes that allow physicians to be reimbursed for a telehealth appointment wherever the patient is located as well as policy changes that doubled the number of telehealth services that could be reimbursed by Medicare. Explains that 29 other temporary federal policy changes should also be considered for being made permanent. Funding Related to COVID-19 Response:

Community Interventions to Address the Consequences of the COVID-19 Pandemic among Health Disparity and Vulnerable Populations (R01- Clinical Trial Optional): Grants to implement and evaluate community interventions testing the impacts of (1) strategies to prevent COVID-19 transmission in health disparity populations and other vulnerable groups; and (2) interventions to address the adverse psychosocial, behavioral, and socioeconomic consequences of the pandemic on the health of these groups. Geographic coverage: Nationwide and U.S. territories. Application Deadline: Aug 28, 2020

Economic Development Assistance Programs Including CARES Act Funding: Grants support the implementation of regional economic development, including public works projects and job creation projects. Past projects have included funding for water and wastewater projects in hospitals and healthcare facilities and road infrastructure projects that would support the expansion of healthcare facilities. CARES Act funding will provide a wide-range of financial assistance as communities respond to, and recover from, the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic. Application Deadline: Applications accepted on an ongoing basis.
